

## Box 7.2.4a: Paired cloze

### Version A

Exploring new places is exciting and challenging, but it can also be extremely dangerous. It can even result in death.

The American pilot, \_\_\_\_\_ [first name] Earhart, for example, disappeared in 1937. Earhart was trying to fly around the world from west to east. She took off from \_\_\_\_\_ [place], California, in a two-seater plane, and flew across the South Atlantic, Africa, Arabia and \_\_\_\_\_ [area].
